

On March 31, the company filed a suit in the Federal District Court for the Northern District of California claiming Canadian Solar is infringing Solaria's U.S. patent covering a process for separating photovoltaic strips from solar cells for use in tiled (aka "shingled") solar modules.

The suit claimed that Canadian Solar infringed Solaria's US patent concerning a process for separating photovoltaic strips from silicon solar cells for use in shingled solar panels.

The Judge's Initial Determination unequivocally demonstrates that Canadian Solar utilized Solaria's innovations and technology without permission and in violation of U.S. patent law.

Solaria on March 31 lodged a patent infringement claim against Canadian Solar related to U.S. patent number 10,522,707, which concerns the process of separating photovoltaic strips from solar ...

Under the terms of the agreement, Solaria has agreed to terminate its litigations against Canadian Solar in exchange for Canadian Solar ceasing its importation of shingled solar modules into the...

The Judge assigned by the ITC to oversee Solaria's lawsuit against Canadian Solar issued an Initial Determination finding that Canadian Solar violated section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended, in its importation of shingled solar modules. The Judge's ruling found a violation of U.S. Patent 10,651,333 and U.S. Patent 10,763,388.

Solaria Corporation, a U.S.-based solar tech provider, settled its patent infringement claims against Canadian Solar, Inc. (CSIQ). Under the terms of the agreement, Solaria has agreed to terminate its litigations against Canadian Solar in exchange for Canadian Solar ceasing its importation of shingled solar modules into the U.S. for seven years.
